Opening Reading

The word "love" is most often defined as a noun, yet all the more astute theorists of love acknowledge that we would all be better if we used it as a verb.

A meaningful definition of the word "love" is from M. Scott Peck's classic *The Road less Traveled*. Echoing the work of Erich Fromm, he defines love as "the will to extend one's self for the purpose of nurturing one's own or another's spiritual growth." Explaining further, he continues: "Love is as love does. Love is an act of will - namely both an intention and an action. Will also implies choice. We do not have to love. We choose to love." (Bell Hooks, *All About Love*)
